Call volume: Glyndon Fire & Rescue had 247 calls for service in 2021. This is a nearly **50%** increase in the past two years. Much of the increase was for medical assistance. As was the case last year, there was an increase in our calls for providing mutual aid, also mostly for EMS service.

Finances: The next few pages show the budget of the fire and rescue departments for 2021. To lessen the confusion of reading the cities financial printouts and paint a clearer picture, it has been broken into three categories.

Operational Revenue/Expenses – This is where the money was brought in or paid out for our regular budget operating expenses- the day-to-day expenses.

Revolving Revenue/Expenses These finances are listed in the budget so they are accounted for but is basically a revolving account. Money in/Money out.

Other Revenue/Expenses – These are some miscellaneous items that are not part of the operational budget.

Capital improvements, utilities, insurance, etc., have traditionally come out of other city budget line items or are withdrawn from other funds. Some of these are being projected into the 2022 budget for a more accurate picture of the cost of Fire/Rescue.

Glyndon Rescue Annual Report 2021

The year 2021 was one for the books, we've averaged a solid 180ish calls for service per year in the past which was blown away by hitting the 250's for 2021 as a department. Within these calls we dealt with everything from the most minor calls for peace of mind to the worst-case scenarios. Our crews have gone into every call with the objective to provide the best possible care to everyone that we possibly can without hesitation.





Everyone was happy to get back to doing Parades and other "Community" type events this year after the cancellation of almost everything in 2020. Community Events/Fundraisers helps us get equipment that we may not otherwise be getting. A few years back we fundraised for our Lucas, an automated CPR Device and fully purchased this piece of equipment through hard work

raising funds, this device has been an amazing tool for our members to have when it comes to life saving situations and has been used a number of times. The support of the Community has

been amazing and truly appreciated. From snacks that get us by on those middle of the night calls to the treats of Brownies and Cookies, it's overwhelming to have the support that we get. Glyndon Fire & Rescue was honored to be part of the Fargo Force Hometown Heroes Event again this year, the event was held January 22nd 2022 but preparations started back in October 2021. The event raised just over



\$63,000 this year. These funds went to First Responder Groups in Cass & Clay Counties. Each group submitted requests for funding and a committee votes and places them in a list which is allocated depending how much is raised. Each group is able to request up to

\$7,500. We requested an array of equipment that we need totaling \$7,326 and were selected to receive funds this year. This will be the 3rd time for us to receive funding from this event.





Everyone has seen some happy moments but with that comes the worst moments as well. I am proud of the dedication of everyone that commits to being a volunteer on the Department and their willingness to jump into any situation that we face, no matter how bad and challenging it may be. The call Volumes continue to rise and, as a County in whole, we've seen the calls for service rise from previous years and continue that trend. Depending on the same group of individuals to continually respond is challenging. You face the chances of burnout with members, but no matter how tired and busy they are they keep answering the call when our fellow



citizens are in need. It makes for some long days when you're up in the middle of the night responding to calls but they still do it every time.



From Fires & Rollovers to Medicals and everything else imaginable we have been called to it over this past year. 2022 Has been off to a steady start again and call volume could easily match last year as more people move into the community and surrounding area of our response territory. It was reported at a recent Clay County EMS Association Meeting, that Sanford Ambulance, formally known as FM Ambulance, averaged 97 calls

for service per day last year, everyday, and this keeps growing. Red River Regional Dispatch alone takes on average over 1,000 calls for service per day covering Cass & Clay Counties.

Sanford Ambulance is still contracted with us to use the Fire Hall as a "Post" Location when they have enough available units to do so. This process has been working well for their response to calls in Rural Clay County. The amount we see them at the hall varies to their availability, as they must have enough trucks available in Fargo/Moorhead before they can send one out to Glyndon. With the greater call volume they are seeing on a daily basis, plus being short staffed needing EMT's and Paramedics, we do see them out here less than we would like. AirMed has been trying out an Auto Launch Program that will automatically request them based on the scenario of the emergency versus having us call and request them. This might only save a few minutes in activating them, but in some scenarios every minute counts when it comes to saving a life. For the Auto Launch Program there has to be certain criteria met for the call including the type of emergency and outside of a 15-



minute transport window to the Hospital, if this is met AirMed will be launched at the same time we are paged out. This does not mean that the patient will be flown. Ground crews can cancel Flight when they are not necessary. If they land and deem that Flight is not necessary for the patient they will still go as ground transport and there will not be any charges associated with Flight when the patient is not flown. They are in the early stages of implementing this and are still adjusting the specifics as it has started.


